4) The PCUSA's Child/Youth/Vulnerable Adult Protection Policy and Its Procedures (note this was approved by 222nd GA for all PCUSA sponsored events such as Triennium, or national conference events. Synods, Presbyteries, and local congregations now need to also develop their own policies. In addition to sexual assault policies there must be policies and procedures to protect children, youth, and vulnerable adults. This policy serves as an example (per the previous resource 'A Guide for Creating...') for other levels of councils within the denomination.

Working for Racial Justice

- Find ourselves in the story of race. Explore our racial autobiography. Debby Irving's book, Waking Up White provides a model. The Rev. Denise Anderson and the Rev.  - Learn about our nation's racial history.
 - Read Lies My Teacher Told Me by James Loewen and The New Jim Crow by Michelle Alexander.
 - Break out of white self-segregation.
 - Intentionally seek out regular social experiences in which you are a racial minority: restaurants, cultural events, political meetings, church services, or volunteer opportunities.
 - Use businesses owned by people of color whenever possible for your goods and services; commit to shopping in neighborhoods other than your own if that is necessary for you to do this.
 - Educate ourselves about the hopes, fears, and desires of people of color today.
 - Include a range of voices addressing race in U.S. politics, economics, popular culture, and civil society in your social media networks.
 - Regularly seek out substantive works of art and popular culture that focus on the lives and experiences of people of color (e.g., watch "Black-ish" or "Jane the Virgin" on TV, see the films *Moonlight, Fences, 13th.*
 - Engage and challenge racism in white social circles
 - Use the Southern Poverty Law Center's resource to respond to racist jokes, or stereotypes in a variety of settings. <u>https://www.splcenter.org/20150126/speak-responding-everyday-bigotry</u>
 - Become an advocate for the Black Lives Matter movement in white circles, engaging white people who have misconceptions or outright resistance about the movement and its goals and methods.
